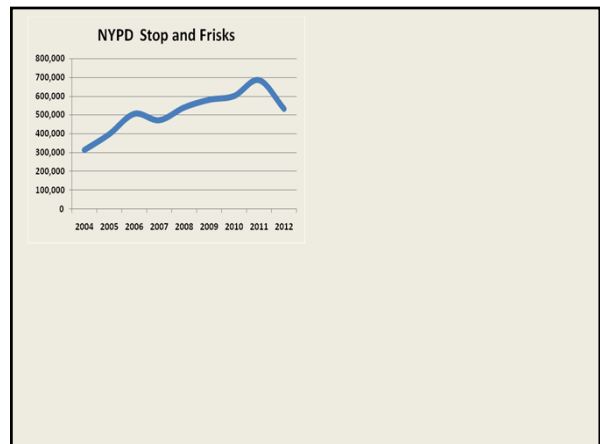


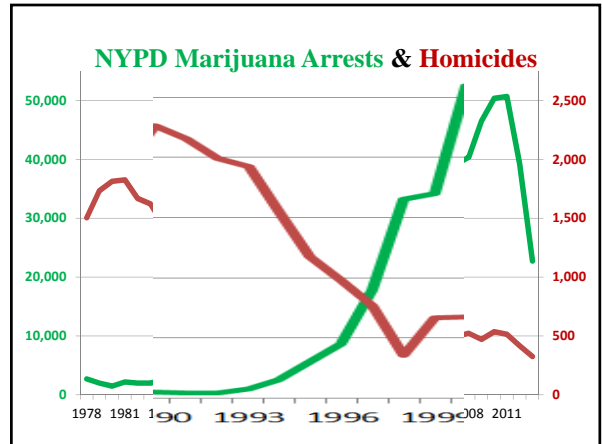
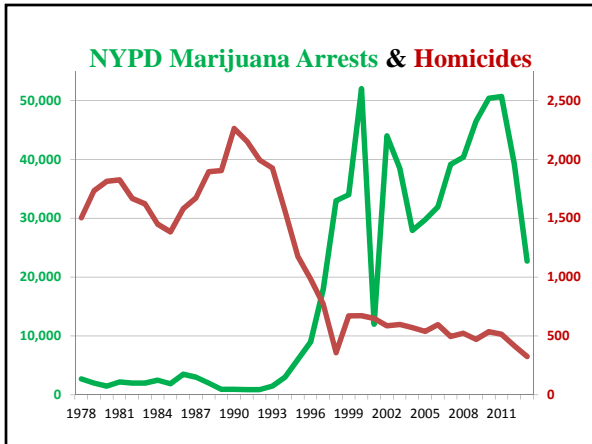
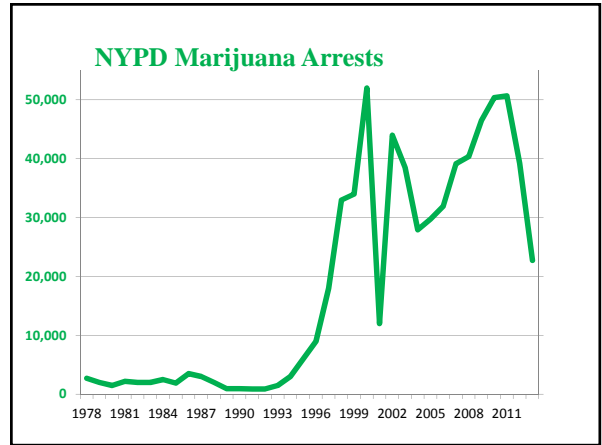
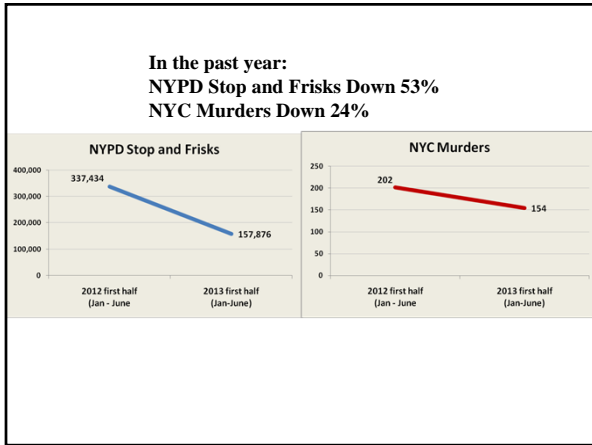
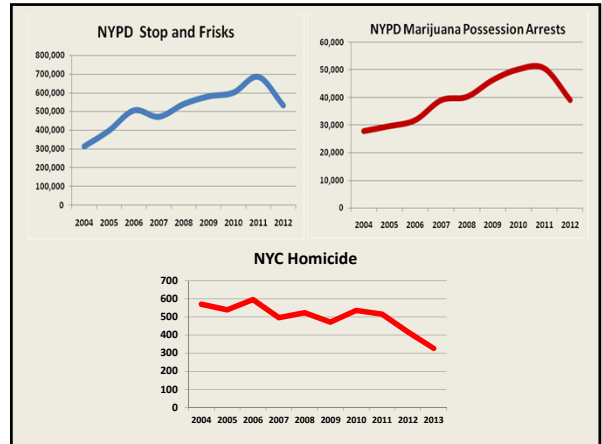
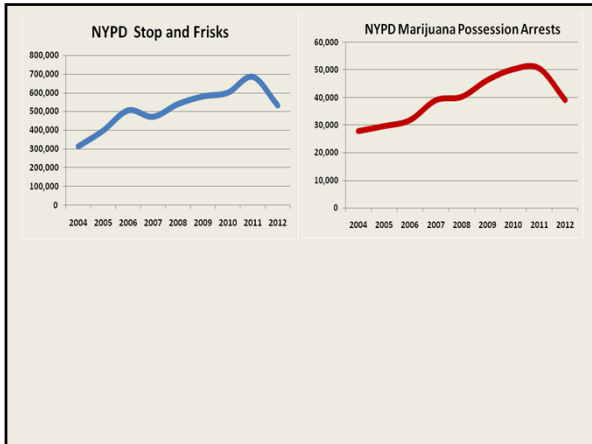
### New York City Adult Arrests (2011)

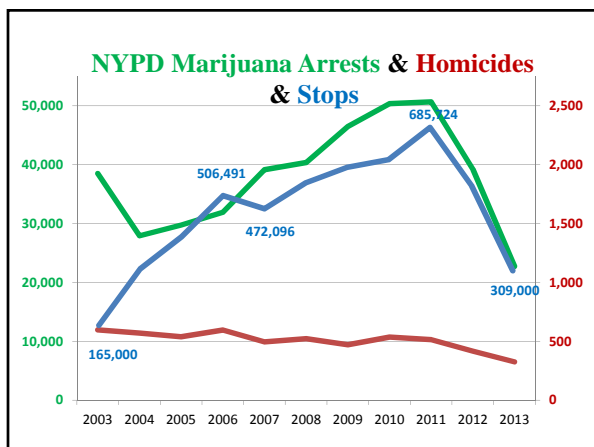
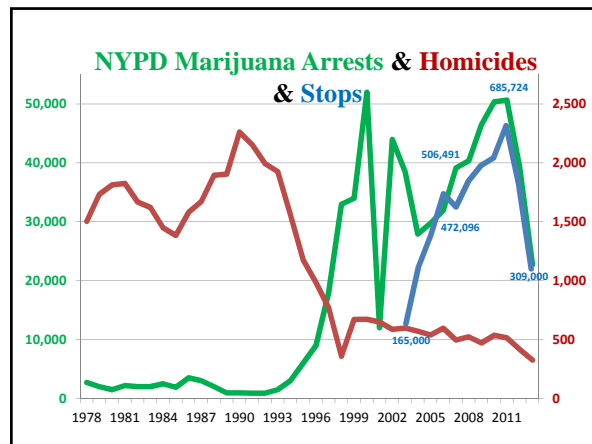
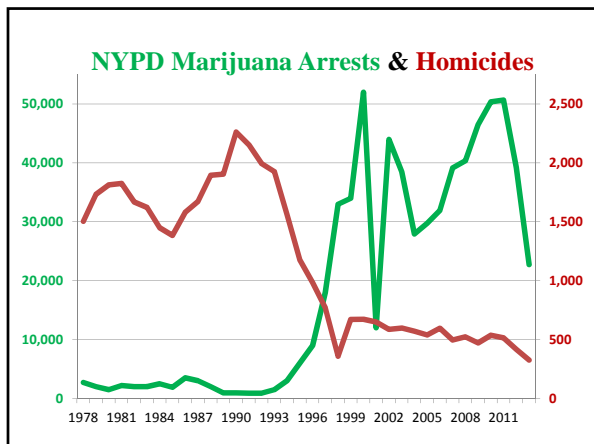
